HERE IS THE LIST OF DOCUMENTS YOU SHOULD BRING WITH YOU TO MEET WITH YOUR ADMISSIONS REPRESENTATIVE.

YOU MUST BRING AT LEAST ONE OF THESE OPTIONS:

YOU MUST BRING AT LEAST ONE OF THESE OPTIONS:	
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☐ Proof of earned income for prior six-months (letter of employment, paycheck stubs, tax return or W-2; unemployment insurance receipt; or Supplemental	☐ Letter from caseworker or public agency person to show status as a foster child, or have been in the foster care system
Security Income (SSI) statement) ☐ Official public assistance document or voucher	☐ Letter from caseworker or provider to verify condition of homelessness
☐ School or USDA free or reduced lunch document	☐ Letter from caseworker or provider to verify you are a victim of severe forms of trafficking
IN ADDITION, PLEASE BRING THE DOCUMENTS THAT APPLY TO YOU:	
School-Related:	
☐ School records, test results or other documentation showing basic skill deficiencies such as problems with English fluency, reading, writing, or computer skills at or below the 8th grade level	☐ If you have a high school diploma (HSD), high school equivalency (HSE) or foreign diploma, provide the official certificate, official transcripts and/or test scores
☐ School records, letter from a guidance counselor or contact number to confirm that you dropped out of school	☐ IEP/504 (if applicable): special education records that may include assessment reports, IEPs and any attached plans such as behavior intervention
☐ If enrolled in school, a letter from the school stating you would benefit more from attending Job Corps than from staying in school, or contact information for a conversation between Job Corps and the school	plans and/or a medical plan
For 16- to 18-Year-Olds:	
☐ Emancipation papers (if claiming to be emancipated)	
☐ A marriage license (if married under age 18)
